





# What makes up a year at Montreat Conference Center?

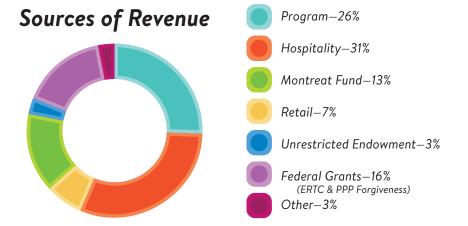

### The Huckleberry Receives a Brand New Look

Since its completion in 1965, the Moore Center has been Montreat's social hub. The snack bar on the top floor, which is today known as The Huckleberry, has always been a place for "refreshments and informal gatherings," as former MRA President Calvin Grier Davis described it.

After years of operation by Montreat College's food service, The Huckleberry was turned back over to Montreat Conference Center in 2020. With the original purpose, refreshments and gathering, as the guiding principle, Montreat began visioning for the space overlooking the dam and Lake Susan.

Once those plans were completed, fundraising efforts identified a group of lead donors who wished to honor the legacy of their family in this valley. "Our family has countless happy memories at The Huck that span generations," said one of the donors. "The renewed vision provides an essential gathering space for all of Montreat – visitors, conferees, Clubs participants, staff, residents, college students – now and for years to come."

After many months of design and construction, and through the generosity of several other donors, The Huckleberry officially opened in August 2022. Leading the operations of the café are Mallory Smith, General





Manager, and Emily Causey, Vice President for Hospitality. "The Huckleberry is more than just ice cream and coffee. Every day I see people gather and make connections, coming together around tables and strengthening bonds which weave together the many parts of Montreat," says Smith.

Today, The Huckleberry is open from Tuesday – Saturday, 8:00 am to 3:00 pm. The menu includes many coffee options and a full menu for breakfast and lunch, as well as ice cream all day. Community groups from hikers to bridge players can be found stopping in throughout the day, so you never know who you'll run into.

With options for breakfast and lunch, customers at The Huck are always able to find something to enjoy!





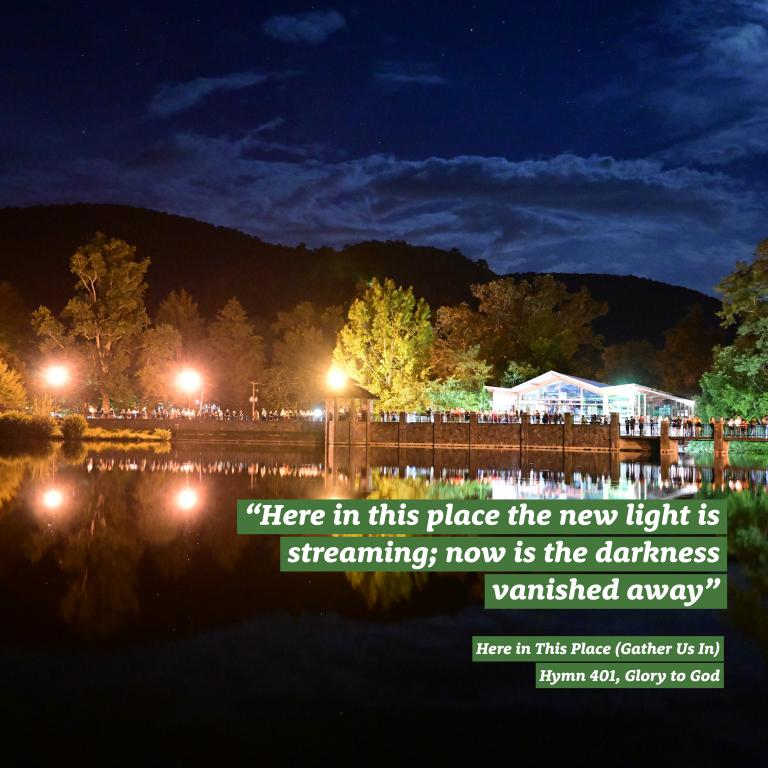
Construction to renovate the space began in spring of 2022 and features a complete refresh of the space.

# Helping Congregations Learn to Thrive

Montreat's Lilly Foundation Grant Makes a Community Impact

Thanks to a five-year grant from the Lilly Endowment, Inc., Montreat Conference Center is forming cohorts of church teams for identifying how community and congregational thriving can be linked. Together, church teams learn how vital community organizing can be to a congregation, both internally and in the community, and work to hone those skills. Black Mountain School of Theology and Community works in partnership with Montreat to teach these skills. The in-person curriculum is interactive and designed to let church teams support one another as they each dive deeply into the particularities of their own communities.

This model – of congregations supporting one another in a process carried out over time – is different from the conference model and intended to allow new patterns and practices to take root in a congregation over a period of 18 to 24 months. The vision is for churches to become students within their own neighborhoods, learning where community needs and desires intersect with the congregation's enthusiasm and energy. The desired result is congregations that become more vital members of their communities – better equipped to listen and respond alongside neighbors – while also becoming attuned to their own gifts and callings as followers of Christ.

Lynn Turnage, Director of Programs at Montreat, explains, "Thriving Congregations moves a church, along with its community, to listen deeply to where the Spirit is calling with respect to what has been and open to possibilities of leading in new ways as God's people. The cohort model adds the dimension of listening to and learning from colleagues across the country. There is great hope in sharing stories and seeing the church exploring, listening, and thinking outside the proverbial box."

The seven congregations who participated in our first cohort will complete their work before the end of the year. In October, we welcomed 14 new churches from Alabama to Wisconsin and California to West Virginia.

Presbyterians are about being reformed and reforming. That's what this process is about! Examining who we are, who our churches are in the community, and all the time listening to each other and God; listening for who God wants us to be, and where or to what God is calling us.
