A Profile on Barry Russell

Barry Russell, the founder and CEO of PRMEDICA in Los Cabos, Mexico, is walking, breathing proof that his regenerative medicine clinic is worth a visit. At 82 years of age, Barry works 80+ hours a week at his medical clinic and still finds time to exercise frequently on his carbon fiber road bike and in his surf kayak. As a result, Barry has more energy and stamina than most people

decades younger. Besides an excellent exercise program and diet, Barry does many of his medical clinic therapies, such as stem cells, exosomes, telomerase activators, NAD+IVs, and other Bio cellular Regeneration techniques to turn back the clock on aging. He looks great, too, but he has not told me about using any of his clinic's skin rejuvenation technologies. I am guessing

no. Barry is more interested in maintaining his ability to stay on his beautiful bike and ride the waves at his favorite surfing spot. As part of his fitness program, Barry has registered and is currently training for the 2022 IRONMAN 70.3 LOS CABOS held on November 6.

Barry became a compounding pharmacist and development chemist after discovering how much he enjoyed exploding stuff in the garage while still a mischievous teen. In 1958 he developed an effective drug for the Asian Flu pandemic, which he sold to major pharmacies throughout the country.

Barry did very well with this discovery. Unfortunately, a vaccine for the Asian flu ended the demand for his profitable drug. Forced by



circumstances and economics, Barry continued to develop many more pharmaceutical drugs, which he manufactured and distributed in countries all over Europe and SE Asia, before "retiring" to Los Cabos, Mexico, in 1988.

Forever the entrepreneur, Barry set up several touristrelated businesses in the Los Cabos area. These included 18 money exchanges (1st bank license ever awarded to a foreign national in Mexico) strategically placed throughout Los Cabos and La Paz, a successful waterfront real estate development of 90 luxury villas, a **CONTINUED ON PAGE 9**

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With no prior knowledge of my recurring back issues, Garcia was like a sleuth looking for clues at a messy crime CONTINUED ON PAGE 12



An avid golfer and tournament player himself, Mickey and several of his Cabo friends launched the first major amateur invitational golf tournament at San Jose's Campo de Golf in 1987. A decade of Mickey Anderson tournaments followed the original, expanding along the way to include a beach party and Battle of the Bands with nearly 300 attendees while picking up big name sponsors including Tecate.

Invitations were extended to friends in the US, Canada and Mexico and drew more than 120 male and female players from as far away as New York and Mexico City. An annual vacationer here, Mickey loved to party which guaranteed that his annual tournaments were week-long

In 2010, Mickey moved out of his vacation home on the corridor to take up permanent residence on Cerritos Beach where he would often introduce himself to Southern Baja locals as "Mickilito," a name that stuck, especially with the owners and staff of local eateries

Mickilito was a man comfortable in his own skin; solo or in a crowd he was noticeably at ease with himself. His warm smile and relaxed countenance made you want to sit down with him and chat. And who could ever forget that Mickey laugh?!

For Mickilito most days would start with yoga on the beach with Anna followed by a trip into town behind the wheel of the little blue truck. {He loved that truck because

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Yikes! Not more COVID-19 Tests?

COVID-19 REQUIREMENTS:

The Secretary of Health of the State of Baja California Sur requires all athletes competing in IRON-MAN 70.3 Los Cabos to provide one of these documents: A) proof of a complete vaccination schedule (minimum two doses) OR B) A negative COVID-19 test result (Antigen or PCR) taken within 72 hours of attending Athlete Check-in. If you choose this option, printed or digital negative COVID-19 test results must be presented at Athlete Check-in before packet pick-up. It is highly recommended that you get tested before arriving at the event to avoid wait times. Athletes unable to meet this requirement will be barred from entering the expo and unable to pick up the necessary race materials that allow for participation in the event.

Do We Need More Housing in Los Cabos? As more people continue to move to Cabo to work – it grows at a pace of 12% a year - more housing is needed. The Mexican Chamber of home Developers (Canadevi) reports that although home developers sold 4,261 homes in our state last year, the need calls for 20,000 more. And better, lower prices for workers who can't afford a small, \$25,000 to \$30,000 USD home, with a minimum lot size of 1,130 sq. ft that the government requires.

Mexico to Create Magical *Neighborhoods Program.* The Mexican Tourism Secretariat (SECTUR) has announced its plans to expand its Magical Towns program by adding Magical Neighborhoods. It is estimated that some 32 emblematic barrios, one for each state of the country will be included in its initial phase. The barrios will then receive federal funding to paint facades, promotion and training courses offered by (SECTUR). Stay tuned, your barrio might be chosen!



Cooking Like a Mexican

One of my favorite places in Mexico is Yucatan; it is not only blessed by breathtaking beaches and stunning natural sites but was also once a very significant region for the ancient Mayan civilization, which reached the highest point of its development here. Many archeological sites can be found there, such as the world-famous ruins of Chichén Itzá. Because it was relatively isolated from the rest of Mexico until not too long ago, Yucatán developed its own unique culture. Life is different in Yucatán, slower, richer somehow; as if time passed gently through and it shows in many ways, one of them is the people, how much of their original dialects and traditions in Quintana Roo, where they were kept, another is food.

One of the leading indigenous cultures of the ancient Americas, the Mayans, began as hunter-gatherers and migrated into the Yucatán peninsula around 2500 B.C. During the pre-classic period (500 B.C.-250 A.D.) they appeared

considered to be the gateway to the Mayan world. Between 300 and 900, the Mayans built several cities in the Yucatán region, two of the most spec-



founded ceremonial centers at Coba, Dzibanche and Kohunlich. Quintana Roo was tacular being Chichén Itzá and Uxmal.

In 987, the Toltec people (believing they were following their god Quetzalcóatl's vision) arrived in the region. According to Toltec mythology, Quetzalcóatl demanded human hearts as a sacrifice, and the Toltecs obeyed by conducting mass human sacrifices. The Toltec's cultural influence on the Mayans in Yucatán was profound, and their architectural influences are unmistakable at Chichén-Itzá. While the Toltecs mixed with the Mayans and other groups, their culture eventually dominated the area.



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During the 12th century, the Mayan city-state of Mayapán clashed against and defeated the citizens of Chichén Itzá. Mayapán took over the region, and the Mayan Cocom dynasty ruled until the mid-13th century. When the postclassic Mayan period ended around 1250, most cities were deserted. Those that remained continued to engage in intercity military conflicts. The disappearance of these great Mayan civilizations remains a mystery; had the Spanish not destroyed the majority of Mayan codices and other writings, the Mayans' destiny might be known today.

Then 1513, Juan Ponce de León sailed near Yucatán but never docked there, while he was on an expedition to Florida. In 1517, while on a crusade to procure slaves, a Spanish conquistador named Francisco Hernández de Córdova made it to the Peninsula and asked some of the indig-**CONTINUED ON PAGE 15**

casino, a nightclub, sports bars, and restaurants. 

Let me start by telling you about the people, the culture,



Local Brokers Building Homes for Needy People

With Cabo Cribs, 'You Buy a Home, We Build a Home'

The first time Leeroy Jarvis flew into Los Cabos from Vancouver, Canada was in 2010. Most recently, he jumped out of an airplane on October 4 and landed safely in Cabo San Lucas at 8:30 a.m. touching down at the grounds of the Cabo Cribs 180 Porto Novo condominium development in the

Tezal-La Cima neighborhood.

The road to Porto Novo is located just off the main fourlane highway driving into Cabo San Lucas via the service road on the right. Go past the remodeled old Pepsi distributing plant, which now has a Mobil gas station out front and a little past that is the Camino





al Tezal dirt road that leads past the Liceo High School College that curls to the right.

While the Camino al Tezal road was once paved by a thin coat of black tar asphalt, that street has long since been washed away by Hurricane Odile (2014) and Tropical Storm Lidia (2017). Jarvis said the government has already scheduled construction of a new concrete road to replace the now dusty, dirt pathway.

And just as Los Cabos is growing, so too has this very nice area of town, where a few years ago they built a beautiful elementary school campus to accommodate the new families. Porto Novo is the new kid on the block, and its philanthropic vision of using its real estate

platform to give back and help those in need is truly amazing.

When Jarvis first arrived in Cabo San Lucas, he had \$20,000 to his name, some clothing, and a dream. Now, a lot of what he envisioned and maybe some things he never even thought of, have become reality as his Cabo Cribs real estate brokerage company now employs 45 agents with sales center offices in Cabo San Lucas and San Jose del Cabo.

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Pre-Construction Sale Agreements

Up until the second quarter of 2022, the inventory makeup in Los Cabos was 817 properties, where pre-construction inventory (430 units) on MLS now exceeds physical inventory (387 units). Source: Dean Short, July 1, 2022, 2022 Q2 Real Estate Market Report, www.caborealestateservices. com

So with more pre-construction inventory in the area, the legal revision of preconstruction sale agreements is becoming a trend.

Whereas the Mexican legis-

lation is fairly adequate for this type of real estate transaction from the civil and commercial standpoint, as of September 22, a new executive regulation became effective to protect customers of pre-construction

The new executive regulation NOM-247-SE-2021 encompasses the latest guidelines for pre-construction transactions, as a result of an ongoing effort to protect customers since the Customer's Protection Law was issued in 1992.

Unfortunately, most of the

real estate developers in Los Cabos do not follow the customer's protection guidelines for pre-construction projects, which leads clients to search for legal advice in the revision of their pre-construction purchase contracts.

These are the 5 most common legal highlights I have come across in the revision of multiple pre-construction agreements, from the customer's protection perspective:

1. Completion Date for the Unit and the Project.

Once the initial deposit has been paid, in my opinion, the best payment structure for the remaining balance in a pre-construction deal, are subsequent payment installments condition to specific and verifiable completion stages of the building, such as breaking ground, foundation, roof, floor, carpentry, etc. and a final payment prior to closing.

This allows buyers to verify the seller's performance and contribute accordingly, or hold payment in case of delays in the construction calendar. Final payment prior to closing is an important incentive to ensure the seller transfers ownership title to the buyer, according to the agreed terms.

Normally, the pre-construction contract will include as an exhibit the plot plan of lo bo you im the

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the unit under construction. However, most of the time, buyers and sellers do not include a description of the amenities and common areas of the project in the preconstruction agreement.

This could lead to confusion and misrepresentations in the future if the finished project is not consistent with the renders or brochures. The legal suggestion is to include a detailed description of the common areas and amenities featured in the project, including specific completion dates according to what is been offered by the sales team.

2. Completion Date for the Condominium Regime

The condominium regime is processed by the developer before the City and includes a detailed description of the project, including surface, measures and boundaries of each individual unit, common areas of the project, such as gym, pool, clubhouse, green areas, etc. and the Rules and Regulations that will govern the community with impor-

tant provisions for HOA assemblies, assessments, homeowner's rights and restrictions, among others.

The incorporation of the condo regime is essential to begin with the closing process and transfer the title to the buyer, so it is important to establish a specific completion date for the seller in the preconstruction agreement.

3. Customized Features and Upgrades

"If it's not in writing, it does not exist". Any customized feature and/or upgrade agreed upon with the seller must be included in the preconstruction agreement in writing. Developers normally

Magical Neigborhoods Program in the Planning Stages

Mexico's tourism secretary Miguel Torruco, announced the tourism secretariat (SEC-TUR) will launch the Magical Neighborhoods program to reinforce the existing Magical Towns, which started 21 years ago and has become a successful program.

Once the neighborhood is designated, federal funds will start flowing to aid in the embellishment of the area with freshly painted facades, improvement to water sewage and pavement, new street lighting and tourism promotion. The Tourism agency works hand in hand with residents of the area so that everyone is happy and agrees with the proposed improvements.

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enous people where he was. When they responded, "Tetec dtan. Ma t natic a dtan" ("You speak very rapidly; we don't understand your language"), he assumed they were answering his question. Having difficulty pronouncing their words, Córdova ultimately called the land Yucatán. In 1519, Hernán Cortés led an expedition that briefly stopped at Yucatán to rescue Jerónimo de Aguilar, a shipwrecked Franciscan priest, before heading north to land in Veracruz.

In 1527, Francisco de Montejo set out to conquer Yucatán but was overpowered by the natives. Three years later, he returned with his son Francisco de Montejo y León but again failed to conquer the indigenous population. Finally, the third attempt in 1537 was successful, and de Montejo founded the cities of Campeche in 1540 and Mérida, the present capital, in 1542. Gaspar Pacheco, known for his

cruel treatment of the natives, completed Spain's conquest of the area.

In an effort to convert the indigenous people to the Catholic faith, Franciscan priests built more than 30 convents in Yucatán (over the traditional temples, mind you) and tried to replace Mayan culture with Christianity. In 1562, Franciscan monk Fray Diego De Landa ordered that all handmade Mayan books and statues be destroyed. Few of these rare and important cultural artifacts survived. In addition, Spanish oppression and diseases significantly reduced the native population from an estimated 5 million in 1500 to 3.5 million a century later.

Jacinto Canek, a conventeducated Mayan, led an indigenous rebellion against the government in 1761. The fighting resulted in the deaths of thousands of natives and the execution of Canek in the city of Mérida. Other indigenous revolts during the colonial period gave Yucatán's natives the reputation of being fierce and difficult-to-conquer warriors.

When Mexico gained its independence from Spain in February 1821, Yucatán became part of the Independent Mexican Empire but remained a remote province until 1824 when it was divided into three states: Campeche, Quintana

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Roo and Yucatán.

In 1835, a conservative unitary system of government was instituted in Mexico and given authority over Yucatán. A mutiny advocating Yucatecan independence erupted in Tizimín in May 1838; in 1840, the local Congress approved Yucatán's declaration of independence-Yucatexit. Hoping to settle the differences,

Mexico's President Antonio López de Santa Anna sent Andrés Quintana Roo to Mérida in 1841. Quintana Roo signed a treaty with the local government, which Santa Anna ignored. Hostilities continued, and Governor Méndez ordered all Mexican flags removed from Yucatán buildings and ships in favor of the flag of **CONTINUED ON PAGE 21**

Fish Report

Cabo San Lucas

September was one of the best in decades, but thus far, October has been an epoch month. Dorado were caught in all sizes; many were thrown back except for the larger ones and the "OMG – over 50-pounders!" Yellowfin tuna and billfish (striped, blue, black marlin, and even a few sailfish) were also around in large numbers. During the past two weeks, Pisces Sportfishing's Rebecca Ehrenberg reported a 100% catch rate for their fleet, meaning that every boat that went out caught fish, and lots of them.

She also observed in the first-ever Pisces Video Weekly Report that October has produced more 40 to 50-pound blue marlin.

dorado than veteran Captains could ever remember during the summer season. For example, the Pisces fleet reported 387 dorado caught and released during the past week alone. Their largest dorado weighed 51 and 52-pounds. In addition, their fleet released 241 billfish.

This was exciting news for the Fall Tournament season beginning this coming week! First, it's the Los Cabos Billfish, followed by the Bisbee Los Cabos Offshore. Both tournaments target billfish and gamefish, including dorado, yellowfin tuna, and wahoo; the Bisbee Black and Blue, one of the largest tournaments in all of Mexico, targets only black and



The Los Cabos Billfish weigh-ins will be held next to the Fisherman's Restaurant each afternoon on October 17, 18, and 19, followed by Bisbee Los Cabos Offshore weigh-in at Plaza Puerto Paraiso, Friday, October 21, and Saturday, October 22, from 2-9 pm on both days. In addition, the Bisbee Black and Blue Tournament will be at Plaza Puerto Paraiso on October 26, 27, and 28 from

The WON Tuna Jackpot November 2 - 5 will target yellowfin tuna, dorado, and wahoo. November 3 and 4, Shotgun Start at 7:00 am. Weigh-In in front of Hotel Tesoro on the Malecon opens at 2 pm and closes at 6:30 pm.

Puerto Los Cabos

Amid the fall season, and with each passing week, more anglers are arriving. The weather has been typical for this time of year, with no storms developing, slightly cooler mornings, primarily clear sunny skies, highs up to 85 degrees, and seasonal north winds beginning to blow from the north, later in the day. Ocean temperatures still average 84 degrees and higher toward San Jose del Cabo and Los Frailes.

Most local sportfishing fleets work the fishing grounds from Palmilla Point north to Cardon, Iman, San Luis, and Vinorama Banks. As a result, bait supplies were holding firm until later in the week, when sardina schools became more scattered and limited. This seems to happen yearly due to heavier pressure from the number of charters all competing for bait resources. Slabs of squid, ballyhoo, and caballito have been other bait options.

The yellowfin tuna action was for a small grade of fish,

Hugo Rafael, from Santa Ana, Calif., was with Captain Pancho from the Tailhunter Fleet in La Paz, and he wanted to catch some inshore pargo and cabrilla for dinner. Using a dead sardina and a 25-pound test line to troll for the rockfish, he hooked this massive bull dorado! Hugo battled the fish for about 30 minutes before he landed it, and when they put it on a hand scale, it weighed out at 26 kilos (57 pounds). Hugo never did catch any rockfish, but he had plenty of meat for dinner. Hugo is only about 5'3" tall!

i.e., 8 to 12 pounds, off Palmilla for anglers who could obtain the live sardina. Mixed in were small-to-medium-sized dorado. It was spotty action, though, and the first boats on the scene had the best chance. Iman, San Luis, and Vinorama are where some larger tuna of 50 to 60 pounds were schooling. Again these fish were also spooky of the pressure, lighter leader, and chum, and more patience was needed. Some charters were lucky to land one yellowfin, and others more fortunate had as

many as five or six. They struck on strips of squid and sardina while drift fishing or fly lining.

Overall, we saw fewer numbers of dorado, mostly smaller ones, though we did see nicer bulls over 30 pounds, and wahoo were in the area. However, with water temperatures still in the 80s, they have not been that active; every day, we see a handful of them come in, striking on ballyhoo, caballito and trolled Rapalas. Sizes ranged from 15 to 40 pounds in areas

offer furniture, appliances or upgrade packages to the buyers that will be included as an exhibit to the pre-construction agreement.

If the purchase price includes a parking lot, garage, storage room or any additional

element in or outside the Unit, it is important to include it in the pre-construction agreement.

4. Guarantee for the Unit and fixtures

Normally the pre-construction agreement will include a one-year guarantee as of the delivery date of the Unit to the buyer, for construction works, hydraulic, sanitary and electrical facilities, and there is no room with the seller for negotiation in these types of clauses.

However, it is important to know that according to the Customer's Protection Law, buyers are entitled to a 5-year guarantee for structural deficiencies of the Unit; a 3-year guarantee for waterproofing; and, 1 year for any other issue

in the Unit. This rule applies even if the developer does not want to include it in the pre-construction agreement and it cannot be waived by the parties.

5. Penalties in case of default

Usually, the pre-construction agreement will include a penalty of 20% of the total purchase price in case of the buyer's default, the amount that will be retained by the seller and any remaining balance returned to the buyer. However, in case of a seller's default, pre-construction agreements normally only provide that the seller must return all amounts paid by the buyer without any interest.

According to the Customer's Protection regulations, the conventional penalty in case of default of any of the parties must be "reciprocal and equivalent", meaning that if 20% of the purchase price applies to the buyer, the same should apply to the seller. In reality, there is very little room for negotiation in these types of provisions, due to the fact that the seller usually encounters multiple challenges during the construction of the project that could result in his default.

Even if the pre-construction agreement does not include a conventional penalty in case of the seller's default, the Mexican Customer's Protection Agency has the authority to award the buyer with a compensation of up to 30% of

the purchase price in case of the seller's default, which ultimately allows to balance the relationship between buyers and developers of pre-construction projects.

A great tool to verify online the reputation of a seller is to consult the bureau of customer claims at: https://burocomercial.profeco.gob.mx/ with the seller's name.



Therefore, several ferry boats sailed over to Topolobampo, but that route is already working at 100% capacity. The delay at this point is of one week, increasing the cost of goods inside the boats and delaying the arrival of fuel, propane and other products. An additional ferry boat has been acquired, but it will take 4 months to get here.



the "Sovereign Nation of the Republic of Yucatán."

Refusing to recognize Yucatán's independence, Santa Anna ordered that Yucatán's ports be blockaded. He also sent an army to invade Yucatán in 1843. The Yucatecans defeated the Mexican force, but the loss of economic ties to Mexico deeply hurt Yucatecan commerce. Yucatán's governor, Miguel Barbachano, decided to use the victory as a time to negotiate with Santa Anna's government from a position of strength. During the ne-

gotiations, it was agreed that Yucatán would rejoin Mexico, as long as their constitution and their right to self-rule were

On these same grounds, we saw quite a few sailfish and some striped marlin. Not much bottom action recently. However, we saw a couple of dogtooth snappers weighing over 40 pounds.

The big three tournaments will start this coming week, Offshore Bisbee, Black and Blue Bisbee, and the WON Tuna Jackpot, which typically have 200 or more teams. This puts even greater pressure on local baits supplies, etc. ... Eric Brictson, Gordo Banks Pangas

East Cape

Excellent fishing this 2022 season! The best fishing is very close, directly offshore of La Ribera. Limits of dorado for all anglers, mixed with lots of striped marlin. Some goodsized yellowfin are being taken daily, and some nice wahoo are coming to the cleaning table daily. Also, lots of good-sized sardina are helping the bite!

The dorado are thick, directly out from the La Ribera Banks to the Lighthouse. Limits for almost all anglers. Fish from 7- to 40 pounds take smaller bright-trolled lures and live sardina from one to four miles offshore. Excellent dorado fishing!

Most boats are releasing at least one striper, and many boats are enjoying multiple releases. Mixed with the dorado on the banks and south to the Lighthouse. Taking lures and ballyhoo with quite a few on sardina. Lots are around.

All the boats are staying inside enjoying the wide-open dorado bite. None are ranging outside looking for the tuna under the Porpoise. Some big tuna to 100-pounds are being taken south off Vinaramas, and a few are mixed in with the dorado closer to the hotel.

The wahoo are in and out. Boats running into them are catching multiple fish. Anglers on our hotel boat, the El Capitan, boated five in two days from 25 to 60 pounds. Some were taken north of Punta Pescadero, La Ribera, and Vinaramas. Marauders and Rapalas worked best...John Ireland, Rancho Leonero



You can tell the seasons are changing. Temperatures are cooler and a bit breezier, especially in the mornings. Us locals have taken to wearing

sweatshirts now in the early hours. Also, those northern winds are starting to blow, and it's getting a bit choppier on the waters.

However, we still have a decent dorado bite going on. Some days, it's better than others. Some boats do better than others, but overall, since most folks are fishing for several days, it all evens out, and everyone goes home with a bunch of fish. Most of it is dorado, but a few tuna, pargo, cabrilla, rainbow runner, and trevally round out the fish boxes.

Other species include jacks, bonito, a surprising number of marlin and sailfish caught incidentally, and even some offseason roosterfish up to about 20 pounds. Dorado are 80% of the catch, and most fish are in the 10 to 15-pound schoolsized fish, with some up to 40 pounds....Jonathan Roldan, Tailhunter International


Before the meal, Marsha warmly greeted her fellow





observed by Mexico City. The treaty reincorporating Yucatán into Mexico was signed in December 1843. However, the central government rescinded earlier concessions, and Yucatán again renounced the Mexican government in 1845, declaring independence

on January 1, 1846.

During the Mexican-American War (1846 to 1848), Yucatán, which considered itself an independent nation, declared its neutrality. However, in 1847, the Caste War (Guerra de Castas) broke out on the peninsula. This war was a major revolt by the Mayan people against the Hispanic population in political and economic control. By 1848,



the revolt had driven all Hispanic Yucatecans out of the peninsula except for those in the walled cities of Mérida and Campeche.

Hoping to suppress the revolt, Governor Méndez sent letters to Britain, Spain and the United States, offering sovereignty over Yucatán to whichever nation could help stop the Mayans. The proposal received serious attention in Washington, D.C., where the matter was debated in Congress. However, the only action taken by the United States was to warn European powers not to interfere in the peninsula.

At the conclusion of the Mexican-American War, Yu-

catecan Governor Barbachano appealed to Mexican President José Joaquín de Herrera for help in suppressing the revolt. Mexico agreed, and Yucatán again recognized the Mexican government's authority, reuniting with Mexico on August 17, 1848. Fighting continued between the forces of the Yucatecan government and the independent Mayans through 1901 when the Mexican army occupied the Maya capital of Chán Santa Cruz. Some Mayan communities in Quintana Roo refused to acknowledge Ladino (Jews of Spanish origin) or Mexican sovereignty into the next decade.

Until the mid-1900s, Yucatán's only contact with the outside world was by sea. As

a result, Yucatán's trade with the United States, Europe and Caribbean islands was far more lucrative than that of all other Mexican states. Yucatán was linked to the rest of Mexico by railway in the 1950s and by highway a decade later. Today, Yucatán's culture remains unique from that of other Mexican states. In the 1960s, the first com-

mercial jet airplanes arrived in Mérida. International airports were built in Cozumel and Cancún in the 1980s, bringing significant tourist income to the region. The Yucatán peninsula, which supports one of the largest indigenous populations in Mexico, also holds the state's largest tourist volume.

For centuries, gubernatorial elections were based primarily on the purity of the candidates' Hispanic ancestry. However, this led to corruption and the oppression of Yucatán's majority population — those of indigenous ancestry. The first governor of Yucatán born of pure Mayan descent, Francisco Luna Kan, was elected in 1976. His victory represented a political break from tradition.

To this day, the people of Yucatan remain rebellious and do not care much for Mexican tourists, especially those not from Mexico City, but are nice

Pelagic Life in Baja

I have always been fascinated by the ocean and attracted to its underwater mysteries. In my research, I came across the term Pelagic. Pelagic isn't only the fishing tackle brand fishermen wear when you see them walking around during our famous fishing tournaments. Actually, the word "pelagic" is derived from ancient Greek (pélagos) which means open sea.

A pelagic zone consists of the water column of the open ocean and is divided into several vertical regions. The Epipelagic is the illuminated surfaced area that most of us swim in and also where most marine life concentrates like plankton, floating seaweed, jellyfish, many species of sharks and cetaceans like dolphins, porpoise and whales. The Mesopelagic is a twilight area where swordfish, squid, and some species of cuttlefish live. The Bathypelagic is where the ocean is pitch black. It still has some inhabitants like giant squids hunted by deep-diving sperm whales. In the Abyssopelagic or abyssal zone, very few creatures live in the cold temperatures, high pressures and complete darkness of this depth. Lastly, the Hadopelagic or hadal zone is mostly formed of trenches.

Pelagic also refers to an ecosystem that relies completely on phytoplankton. Phytoplankton manufactures its own food using a process of photosynthesis. This is why it inhabits the upper sunlit epipelagic zone. It is this plankton that feeds migratory forage fish like herring, anchovies, capelin, and menhaden and consequently their predators: sea lions, billfish(marlin, sailfish, swordfish) tuna, and tuna-like species like yellowfin and bluefin, skipjack Mahi Mahi, bonitos, oceanic sharks

and large rays.

Many of us have never heard of Pelagic life before, but the Baja Sur Peninsula is teeming with it. It is thanks to it that some of the largest and richest fishing tournaments in the world are held in Los Cabos like the Black and Blue, The Bisbees and the Tuna Jackpot to name a few. Sport fishing is highly practiced from Cabo San Lucas and San Jose del Cabo to the Eastcape, Punta Gorda, Los Barriles and Los Frailes.

But not only the anglers can spot and interact with pelagic fish and other pelagic creatures. Whether you are sailing, yachting, boating, surfing, free diving or spearfishing, snorkelling or scuba diving, you are most likely to have a Pelagic encounter. Scuba divers enjoy that privilege in protected areas like Cabo Pulmo National Park, and the islands of Espiritu Santo and Cerralvo. At Cerralvo Island there is a dive spot called La Reina where the number of gigantic rays has seemed to increase thanks to

to call an 800 number, change the 800 to 001 880 to call an 888 number, change the 888 to 001 881 to call an 877 number, change the 877 to 001 882 to call an 866 number, change the 866 to 001 883 to call a 855 number, change the 855 for 001 884 to call a 844 number, change the 844 for 001 885

Best to talk fast because these numbers are not toll free. And yeah, we know any business that deals in toll frees doesn't have a live person answering the phone, so good luck with making it a speedy call.

the efforts of several non-profits like Manta Pacifico. This site offers a magnificent spectacle of colourful large groupers, moray eels, turtles and other small pelagic species such as nudibranchs, frogfish and seahorses. At Espíritu Santo Island in La Lobera islet lives a colony of over 400 seals. At El Bajo dive site there is a large school of hammerheads. This is great news because, in 2009, the International Union for Conser-

vation of Nature (IUCN) had them on their red list of threatened oceanic sharks. At Punta Lobos, a school of mobula rays lives and thrives. At the Swanee Reef, nudibranchs and octopus abound.

More recently, an incredible male orca named Moctezuma was documented again this past July exercising highly developed hunting strategies. Just off La Paz Bay at El Mogote, snorkelling whale shark tours happen every year from December to April. Higher up In Loreto Bay scientific expeditions are held researching the blue whale, and the rare sperm, fin and pilot whales have been seen here before.

In Cabo San Lucas there is a zodiac type of expedition that submerges hydrophones so you can actually hear humpback whales singing and clicking. More accurately called whale vocalization or echolocation, rapid bursts of high-frequency clicks help obtain sonic information about the environment, find prey, and sexual selection. Marine biologist Philip Clapham describes their singing as "probably the most complex in the animal kingdom." Humpback whales have also been found to make a range of other social sounds to communicate such as "grunts", "groans", "thwomps," "snorts" and "barks". All cetaceans use echolocation and clicks as a **CONTINUED ON PAGE 30**

Know the law

You've probably heard that there are some crooked cops who will pull you over because of your gringo status or foreignplated car... well, if you do get pulled over, know the law!

The cops are not allowed to take your license. If you do get pulled over, ask the cop for the ticket or follow them to the local police department to pay your fee.

Don't hand over your license or cash. Paying a bribe or *morditas* is illegal for you and for the cop.

Feel like you've been taken advantage of? *Sindicatura* is an organization run by the Mexican government that investigates corrupt police interactions.

Prepare for hurricane season

If you're from somewhere

that doesn't get hammered with hurricanes and they're more of a foreign concept to you, listen up!

Hurricane season comes every year. It's from May 15 to November 30 with most storms active from August to October. Whether or not the peninsula gets hit by a hurricane or tropical storm is a toss-up, but you still need to know how to prepare.

- Stock up on food and fresh
 water
- Gas up your vehicle and get an extra fuel can to fill your generator or car.
- Look around your casa and consider that anything that isn't embedded in the concrete can (and will) become a flying projectile. Have a plan for where all those items are going to go in the event of a storm.
- If you're here all year, investing in a generator to keep your AC running might also be a good idea.

Keep in mind that the power infrastructure in Mexico is likely not as robust as you're used to. A thunderstorm can knock out the

and friendly anyway. They do, however, know when a tourist is being respectful and appreciating of their culture and will welcome them with open arms.

This edition's recipe is an ode to Yucatan, its culture, ingredients and people, Sikil Pak (see-kheel pack) is a quick and delicious recipe for a dip. If you are a frequent reader, it will be no news that pumpkins are ancient Mexican ingredients; better said: Mayan ingredients. Sikil Pak means seed and tomato, which is essentially what this recipe is.

Ingredients:

- 1 cup of pumpkin seeds
- 2 tomatoes
- 2 green chiles (jalapeños or serranos, if you're feeling adventurous you can try with habanero)

¼ of an onion or 3 green onions

A bunch of cilantro

Salt to taste

Procedure:

Grill the tomatoes until the skin is charred and peels off easily.

In a blender, puree the tomatoes, chiles (can be fewer or more, depends on your liking) cilantro onion or green onions, and salt. Make sure you don't add too much water but blend well, we want a paste consistency at the end.

Roast the pumpkin seeds slowly, making sure you don't burn them.

Grind the pumpkin seeds into a powder (extra points if you do it in a molcajete)

Strain the tomato mixture and combine with the pump-kin seed powder and mix into a dip!

Serve with totopos (tortilla chips)

sonar. Also, in Cabo San Lucas a Shark Pelagic Safari offers a lifetime close encounter with mako, silky, hammerhead and

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blue sharks.

Still, on the Sea of Cortez, La Ventana village seems to be a hot spot for freediving and spearfishing. Either reef or bluewater spearfishing provides an opportunity to interact with pelagic species especially yellowtail tuna, wahoo, Mahi Mahi (dorado), leopard grouper, pacific crevalle jack, dog snapper and sierra. Since I am more of a conservationist type, free diving sounds like a more reliable way to immerse oneself in the pelagic world without the obstruction and heaviness of scuba gear or a spear gun.

Baja Sur isn't short of nonprofits trying to protect the Pelagic abundance and promote sustainable tourism. Pelagic Life and Whale Shark Mexico have joined forces to tag whale sharks and giant mantas with satellite devices in the Revillagigedo National Park (UNESCO World Heritage Site) and Isla Cerralvo in order to register their swimming profiles and their movement patterns. They are also teaming up with Pelagios Kakunjá in shark conservation efforts.

Pelagic life has a Youtube Channel and has produced several documentaries like Pelagic Mexico, a film about Mexico's oceanic treasures that seeks to inspire people to take up the mantle of respect and conservation through ecotourism. Here is a list of their productions:
