



PASTOR'S GREETING

Dear Hamline Church.

Summer at times seems like a slow season in the church, and in some ways, it is – several ministries and programming go on summer break or happen less frequently, and the pace seems to slow down. However, there are also a lot of special things that happen just in the summer – Compassion Camp, youth mission trip, Boundary Waters trip, Young Leaders Program, SPROUT Garden, outdoor worship and, of course, the Hamline Dining Hall – to name a few!

In the summer there are also a lot of behind-the-scenes things happening as well including some significant developments for our congregation that I want to share with you.

Student Ministry Visioning & Strategic Planning Process - In June the Church Council voted to engage in a visioning and strategic planning process for student ministries in relationship with Ministry Architects, a church consulting firm that specializes in this area. Our children's ministry program is growing, and we continue to rebuild youth ministry after the pandemic. We are blessed by the leadership of Katie Morris and feel this is the right time to really invest in and strengthen this area of ministry. We are hoping this process will help us better meet the needs of our growing membership now and for the future.

Property Condition Assessment & Accessibility Projects - We are in the process of conducting a property condition assessment with the generous help of church member and Council Co-Chair Angela Wolf Scott. A property condition assessment is a thorough evaluation of the condition of the building. Additionally, we recently complete an energy audit and are now undertaking an accessibility audit as we seek to improve our welcome and inclusion for people with disabilities. We have already started to address some of the quick fixes for accessibility and we will include the larger improvements into our capital projects list and future financially planning in conjunction with the findings of the assessment and energy audit.

Similarly, we've really, really been wanting to update the sound system in the sanctuary to make for a more accessible and inclusive worship experience for everyone, and especially for those who are hard of hearing. Most of our sound system's infrastructure is over 30-40 years old. We are fortunate to have some bequest funds designated for this project, however we will need some additional financial support to complete the project in the ballpark of \$20-30,000. Childcare Transition Update - We've enjoyed a strong ministry partnership with the Learning Garden/Midwest Child Development as we've shared use of the building for the past 8 years. MCD is now in a time of transition. Brandy Henry will take over as the center Director or July 1 and will eventually move into full ownership. We give thanks for the partnership we've shared with MCD, especially their leadership, staff, and families; and we are looking forward to building another strong relationship with Brandy.

Building & Landscaping projects - You can read more about some of these projects in the update from our Facility Manager, Stephanie Engebrecht, on page 14. But of special note is that the playground will be getting a facelift as we replace the aging rubber tiles and dirt spots with synthetic turf! The installation is scheduled for August, and we look forward to a refreshed space for children to enjoy that is more accessible, safer, easier to maintain, and allows for an expanded playing season in fall and spring months. This renovation was made possible through a generous memorial contribution in honor of Hamline Church member Karl Schwichtenberg.

Though at times the lists seem never ending, we are keeping things moving at Hamline Church this summer! In a season where time seems to move differently, I am reminded of the teaching by the great Teilhard de Chardin who advises us to, "Trust in the slow work of God." As I mark the start of my 9th year of being your pastor, I can attest that to the truth of this statement. Because when I look to the past, present and future – it is clear to me, that God is indeed at work with us and around us. Thanks be to God!



SCHOOL TOOLS

It's that time of year when Hamline Church members help preK-12 students in need. The Interfaith Action School Tools Drive starts now and continues until August 15. Look for the gray bins in the commons and narthex to drop off your donations. This drive is an easy way to join together with area faith communities and organizations to help children in our community who are affected by poverty. These students need school supplies this September. The drive is led every year by our Social Justice and Missions Committee.

The collection focuses on new backpacks and school essentials to benefit children from families with low-income who are served through nine different programs in the St. Paul area. Annually faith communities, businesses, and individuals collect more than \$24,000 of school supplies to fill hundreds of backpacks!

Supplies needed are backpacks, calculators, spiral and composition notebooks, pencils, pens, markers, colored pencils, crayons, erasers, highlighters, pencil sharpeners, glue sticks, glue bottles, scissors, rulers, facial tissues, school boxes, hand sanitizer, three-ring binders, loose-leaf paper and folders.

UPDATE FROM EMMA NORTON - RESTORING WATERS CONSTRUCTION AND CAMPAIGN MAKING GREAT PROGRESS

May and June were exciting months at the construction site for Restoring Waters! Following the completion of the base for level 1, concrete columns were erected last month, then shoring and decking were installed, creating a working surface for the construction of level 2. Post-tension cables, sleeves and conduit were installed on level 2, in preparation for pouring the concrete for that level. Further down on the sublevel of the building, shoring was removed, then conduits, cables, and a vapor mitigation system were installed. We're happy to share that construction is continuing on schedule, and that wood framing for Restoring Waters is set to be completed later this month!

Our Home + Healing: The Campaign for Restoring Waters continues to make great progress as well! We have currently received gifts or pledges for more than \$2.3 million dollars on our way to our goal of \$3.75 million to help provide truly transformational housing and growth for women, individuals, and small families. Gifts from our Foundation partners, corporations, church partners, and individuals are all making a huge difference in our ability to create trauma-informed and healing spaces for our residents. 2023 ANNUAL CONFERENCE HIGHLIGHTS

Congratulations to Hamline University Chaplain Kelly West Figueroa-Ray on her commissioning as an Elder at the MN Annual Conference!

Theme: Drawing on Luke 24:13-35, the theme of this year's gathering is "Encounter. Transform. Respond. The Emmaus Experience." This post-resurrection story where everything has changed and the implications still seem a bit cloudy mirrors the time and space we are living in as a church. We, like the two disciples, are on the road,

asking deep questions, and trying to make sense of what it means to be a disciple of Jesus today. And we, too, are finding that we encounter Christ in transforming ways when we do.

Bishop's Episcopal Address: In the Emmaus Road story, the impossible becomes possible as the world is made right again through encounters with the resurrected Christ ,who brings healing, reconciliation, and hope. Bishop Lanette Plambeck, in her inaugural Episcopal Address, reminds us that this story for the two disciples on the road is our story too. During this challenging time in The United Methodist Church, she invited those of us in the Minnesota Conference to lean in to one another and declare that there is enough love for all of us, and she reminded each person: You are loved. You are a child of God and a person of worth. There are no exceptions. (Watch or download Episcopal Address.)

Milestones in ministry: Those gathered honored and thanked 14 clergy entering retirement, and they celebrated four pastors ordained as elders, two commissioned as provisional members, three local licensed pastors who completed their five-year course of study, and 13 people authorized to serve as local pastors in the congregations and ministry areas in which they are appointed.

Fresh expressions with Michael Beck: Rev. Dr. Michael Beck is Co-Pastor of two Florida churches and a network of "fresh expressions" led by laity that gather in various community venues and public spaces around shared interests and hobbies. He talked about fresh expressions as a new movement of Christian communities where people with no connection to the church are finding life and encountering Christ. Dinner Church whereby people gather to share a meal is an easy starting point for a fresh expression, Beck said. Some of the other fresh expressions he's involved with take place in a tattoo parlor, at a restaurant, in a virtual reality space, at a dog park, and even at Tesla charging stations.

Connectional address by Bishop McAlilly: Bishop William (Bill) McAlilly of the Nashville Episcopal Area took part in Annual Conference and reminded attendees that we are a connectional church. In his connectional address, he spoke about what it means to live with courage and boldness. This includes knowing and living our "why" as Christians, loving God and our neighbor, and leaning into the future with "holy boldness"—not knowing exactly what's in store but trusting that God is with us.



Sermon by Rev. Becky Jo Messenbrink: This year's Conference Preacher (selected by a random drawing at the end of last year's Annual Conference) was Rev. Becky Jo Messenbrink, who serves Eden Prairie UMC. She talked about her desire for an expandable table and reminded those gathered that Jesus' table was for everyone. "Perhaps the Church is called to mirror the table which Jesus sets—an expansive table of belonging and community where all are welcome, where all are included and celebrated and treasured, an expansive table at which Jesus can be recognized, and where the kingdom of God is present and talk about God turns into encounters with the living God," she said.

2023 ANNUAL CONFERENCE HIGHLIGHTS

Love Offering: Conference members, on behalf of their churches gave just over \$40,000 to the 2023 Love Offering. Sixty percent of it will fund a new grant to support churches that have partnerships with mental health services offered in local schools or communities, 30 percent will go to three Minnesota nonprofits engaged in mental health education and advocacy, and 10 percent of the Love Offering each year goes to Volunteers in Mission scholarships, which support first-time mission trip participants. You may continue to donate throughout 2023.

Legislation: Hundreds of voting members in attendance at Annual Conference approved all pieces of legislation before them, including resolutions opposing assault-style weapons, addressing the Israeli detention of children, and supporting both a U.S. Regional Conference and the removal of all discriminatory policies and harmful language related to sexual orientation from the Book of Discipline.

Disaffiliating churches: Members ratified the terms of disaffiliation agreements made between the conference Board of Trustees and 14 local churches that have discerned that their path goes a different direction from the Minnesota Annual Conference. After the vote, Bishop Lanette asked Minnesota United Methodists to keep these congregations in their hearts and to pray that even as we part ways, they may continue to live out their faith and serve as a beacon of light and hope for all.

GREENWAY DRAINAGE

A long-time ongoing project has finally seen it's completion, with the replacement of the drainage trenches in the Greenway. The original concrete trenches were not effective in moving water away from the building, so for two years we have needed to have very long and unsightly gutter pipes attached. We now have underground drainage pipes that will move the water away from our building and into the rain gardens located on the other side of the sidewalk. We also have some new slow-growing fescue grass that is in the early sprouting phase.

COMPASSION IN ACTION LANDSCAPING PROJECT

During the week of VBS, Katie, Stephanie, and the SPROUT Garden interns (Gabe, Bella, and Clair) assisted the children in stewarding the care of our rock swale on the north side of the building near the playground. Together they cleared it of all weeds and transplanted some of the hostas and pollinator plants. They also converted part of the space to an open play area. Now, next to an existing butterfly garden, we have a berm layered with "fairy rocks" (white colored landscape rocks) and a weather-proof house that was donated by Terry Naseth (thank you Terry!).
