East Cape Future to be Debated. As the East Cape continues growing rapidly, the Legacy Works Group has organized a group of workshops called East Cape Futures, to be held December 5 to 7 at the Hotel Palmas de Cortez in Los Barriles. A group of 21 experts in different areas will be discussing the future of key needs including water availability, impact on the ecology and the communities around the area, sustainable construction and much more. The Legacy Works, according to its website, "enables communities to address complex challenges and meet critical needs through highly collaborative

Los Cabos Airport Traffic Increases Again. The GAP Group, which operates 14 airports in Mexico, reported an increase in international passenger arrivals of 31 percent in October, compared to 2019. There was also an increase of 49.7 percent in domestic flights. Whoooha!

Are open Skies in Mexico **Coming?** Maybe, maybe not. President Andres Manuel Lopez Obrador (AMLO) said during one of his conferences that he wants to allow any foreign airline to fly between cities in Mexico. He also said the competition will reduce

airfares and benefit Mexicans.

Numbers Continues. So far this year until September, 15.5 million international tourists have visited Mexico, an increase of 61 percent over the same period in 2021. The tourism secretariat reports that the international airports of Los Cabos, Cancun and Mexico City accounted for 11.7 million air travelers.

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Whale Shark Watching Season Begins! Every year, over 30 whale sharks visit La Paz bay from October to March, making them a great attraction for tourists or locals to watch them or even swim with them. These massive, largest known extant fish species can reach a size of 512 feet long and weigh over 30 metric tonnes. Let's go swimming with them!

New Coral Reefs Coming *Up.* The Baja Ferries company, which operates the ferry boats between Mexico's mainland and the Baja, announced their new "More Live to the Sea," aimed at growing coral reefs in the Sea of Cortez. A group of expert divers have been planting PVC structures at the bottom of the sea, adding small pieces of coral, which in time grow and grow and grow. Thank you, Baja Ferries!

He suggested our meals, to which we agreed, and everything was fabulous ... until some very salty kala-

mata olives got in the way. Yes, my pasta came with kalamata olives that were sooo salty that they were inedible.

When Fabrizio came to check if we were happy, I said, "I love the pasta but the olives are too salty" to which he responded, obviously upset and unconvinced, "That can't be," and left us. He returned a few minutes later and said, "You were right! You can't eat

those!" and offered to replace my plate with something else. Since I had already eaten about half of the pasta, I said, "No. Don't worry. It's not your fault and I am happy with the wonderful pasta." We have been friends ever since.

My son and I showed up

for my Birthday dinner last week. Fabrizio walked us into the restaurant's cava, where a table for 12 was set up. I thought it was too much, but he insisted and sat down with us. He ordered a sample of dishes to share, in good Italian tradition.

We enjoyed a few (not) glasses of sparkling wine, white wine and red wine to accompany our dinner which started with a Bruschetta with extra

virgin olive oil, tomato and spices, followed by a Tartar di Pesce, Insalata di Mare, pasta with clams, shrimp and lobster from the North Atlantic and a Rib Eye. These were followed by 5 desserts, the



best Tiramisu for the birthday boy, Caramel flan, Chocolate volcano, Semiffredo (2 pieces of white and dark chocolate), and homemade limoncello and mangocello.

day confirmed what the locals already knew - it's the holidays in Los Cabos.



Sarahuaro is a nonprofit organization that has served the Cabo community since 2005. During this time, thousands have benefited from their programs. They provide meals to impoverished children while in school – about 5,000 per month. These children are sent to school without breakfast and are given no lunch options by the school district. Most only eat a dinner meal. It is not the ideal situation to prepare a young mind for a day of learning.

They also provide no-cost training to disadvantaged women to better their lives: life skills, workforce instruction, and English. Their signature program is Family Planning. Did you know that in 2017 in Mexico two babies were born each day to 10 and 11-year-old girls? Or that Mexico has one of the highest rates of teen pregnancies in all the developed countries, and Los Cabos has the highest in Mexico – 8%? It's a real problem here.

Having served Cabo for several years, Sarahuaro has come to know what a generous, giving community we live in. So many have stepped up to lift the impoverished through Sarahuaro, and now another unique event sponsor has appeared, Producciones de Peces Locos!

Producciones de Peces Locos, or simply Pescado Loco, is a creation of long-time local residents Carolyn & Ron Kirk. It produces and promotes musical concerts in the United States with an emphasis on charity benefits. As a new venture, they plan a television show highlighting Cabos sites, activities, restaurants, beaches - all the amazing features offered in this beautiful district. What happens when a Certified Sommelier and a Managing Director of Wine and Spirits come together to create a business? The result is a company that prides itself on working with and sourcing wines from small boutique wineries all over the world, and we here in Los Cabos receive the benefit of tasting some of the finest wines in existence!

Paulina Lopez, Certified

Sommelier and Rogelio Ricardez, Managing Director, are the two partners behind Fine Wine M, located in San Jose del Cabo just across the street from the Municipal Mercado on Calle Mauricio Castro. Charlie and I stopped by one day after our shopping trip at the Mercado as the sign "Fine Wine M" attracted me to their door. I love wine and love writing about it to educate our locals and ex-

pats, so I arranged a meeting with Paulina and Rogelio to find out about this wonderful venture

Both Paulina and Rogelio have 15 years of business in the wine and spirit distribution and sales arena. They have worked for large corporate companies, as well as local Baja distributors, resorts, and restaurants, and decided they wanted to get closer to the source rather than work with large companies, VPs and distributors. They have an authentic passion for wine and are constantly discovering new boutique winemakers to add to their collection.

Fine Wine M opened almost a year ago and currently,

their main business is to supply specialty wines to hotels and restaurants. They offer those unique wines that are not available from other sources here and are all small-production wines from family vineyards. Last March they decided to open a small retail store next to their warehouse in order to approach the consumer and introduce them to some special offerings not available elsewhere. Fine Wine M currently carries 250 labels and although they have some wines from all over the world, their primary focus is on Mexico, the United States and France. They also have a lovely portfolio of Italian wines. I was very impressed

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with their collection, so many labels I had never seen or heard of, and coming from a background of wine procurement myself, it was quite a surprise. I was also very impressed with both Paulina and Rogelio as they present themselves as true professionals with a very strong

### **Cooking Like a Mexican**

Christmas is right around the corner and I think you should all jump on the wagon. The star Mexican Navidad drink is ponche; it's delicious, warm, spicy, festive AAAAND it can be boozed up for the grownups. Bonus: your house will smell like Christmas for sure. My favorite thing about ponche is it has a bunch of ingredients that are pretty unusual for foreigners It's always a great way to show our heritage, traditions and how incredible it is that ingredients from so far away are local staples in our recipes.

One of the most interesting ingredients in ponche is tejocote (Mexican hawthorne), and you either love it or hate it. There's really no in between. We're talking about a small fruit that comes from a tree. The name is from Nahuatl

originally: Texocotl, tetl-stone, xocotls -- bittersweet fruit. It looks like a tiny apple and is very tart. The tree is wild, full of thorns and can grow on diverse soils and weathers, but

and iron. This particular fruit is mostly consumed cooked, and to eat it raw, it must be very, very ripe. Tejocote season starts in October and ends in January,



it is more comfortable around the volcanic areas in central Mexico. Tejocote is very rich in vitamin A and C, calcium

which is probably why it is so often used in Mexican Christmas punch. I think it should be named a superfruit since it lowers blood sugar levels and can also be made into a tea which helps with respiratory problems like cough, pneumonia, bronchitis, flu and the common cold.

Another interesting ingredient is sugarcane, which made its way from Guinea to Asia and then to Spain, and then in 1522 Cortez brought it to the Americas. Sugar cane expanded through (now Mexican) territory three years after the fall of Tenochtitlan; the weather and high demand for sugar were



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great excuses for this crop to be found countrywide. It was often referred to as honey with no bees, and it soon overtook even cotton plantations. Interestingly enough, it was sugar cane plantations and sugar refineries that were some of the most affected during the Independence movement; most of the sugar business was owned and operated by Spaniards but labored by indigenous people.

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


### 4. Developing a Plan and Keeping it Simple



### Real Estate Knowledge- The Power of the Pagare

A couple of years back we were trying to sell our condo and after 2 years on the market and holding the line on a price we were still getting lots of viewings but no offers. Everyone commented on the lovely complex, the lovely views, and the lovely layout and furnishings, but no one was willing to step up and show us the money. I contacted our very patient and hard-working real estate agent and asked - without dropping the price - what else could be done. She quickly responded saying we should consider carrying the financing for a buyer, using a Pagare. A "paga-what" I responded; she then proceeded to explain it to us.

Pronounced 'pag-are-ay', it's essentially a Promissory Note, or legal IOU, given to us by the buyer to allow them to pay for the purchase over a period of time. We carry their financing. At first, we weren't warm to the idea of financing a buyer, let's be honest, we really just wanted out, to get our money back and be done with it. However, it was obvious that wasn't happening and seeing continued buyer interest we thought we should at least

consider the idea. We trusted our real estate agent, but as Gringo snowbirds we were wary about a Mexican Promissory Note from some person from somewhere else who we might never even meet. When our agent said they used them in over half of their sales and had never had a problem, we were willing to hear more.

The challenge for Gringos buying real estate in Mexico is you can't get local financing as you can back home. In fact, we had originally raised money for our purchase of the condo through our bank in Canada, using the equity on our home there as the collateral. This worked for us as we started with a mortgage-free home and knew the strong collateral would get us the lowest interest rate.

Since we had paid off our condo purchase long before listing it for sale, we were ready for a crash course in how a Mexican Promissory Note was going to solve our current problem. Our agent explained the Pagare was more like a mortgage than just a Promissory Note as it was secured by the property. We

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### Norm 247 – Consumer Protection for Property Buyers

Mexico's federal consumer protection agency, PROFECO, has just taken a giant step forward in protecting the home buyer and his rights when acquiring property in Mexico.

September 22 marks the day NORM 247 went into effect. As of that date, FULL DISCLOSURE became law for all residential housing. Gone are the days when evasive agents could tell a story that was less than correct, and get away with it! Penalties for misleading information are hefty and complaints can and will be filed.

Among the essential items covered by the law are:

Advertising - must be

truthful and accurate, misleading advertising is prohibited

Costs and property prices must be written in Mexican pesos. Dollars may be included but with the notation that the real price will be that of pesos on the date payment is made.

Properties offered for sale must disclose the status of services such as electricity, telephone, gas and water. Offgrid properties can be sold but full disclosure is a must.

All advertising and websites must include a working telephone number for customer service.

In an Offer to Purchase the consumer-buyer has a right to cancel within five days of sign-

ing the offer.

Defective construction – Buildings must have a five-year guarantee on the structure and a one-year guarantee on all else. Failure of a contractor to respond can result in penalties of up to 20% of the purchase price.

Contractors must indicate the source of their construction funds.

Buyers have the right to select the notary public who will formalize their purchase.

All forms for offers to purchase and related documents must be registered with and approved by PROFECO.

In addition to PROFECO, we have other groups, governmental and private, that look out for and protect Buyer and Seller rights when purchasing properties in Mexico, including:

AMPI, the Mexican Association of Real Estate Professionals with more than eighty chapters in Mexican cities. AMPI was founded more than fifty years ago and is associated with the U.S.-based



National Association of Realtors\* (NAR) AMPI and NAR both have strict Codes of Ethics to which all members must adhere to.

MLSBCS. The Baja California Sur Multiple Listing Association which has developed over the past twenty years, a set of operating policies and procedures which govern the listing and promotion of properties in the state. Members must adhere to these rules or be fined or removed from the association.

BCS Licensing authorities. The Economy sub-secretary

oversees and approves the credentials of those licensed as brokers and their agents. No one may promote the purchase of a property without a license unless he or she is the owner of the property being offered for sale. Any person representing the sale of another's property must be licensed by the state.

For those considering the purchase of a property in Baja California Sur, these entities have overseen the quality and professionalism of its brokers and agents. It probably enjoys stricter governance and affords greater buyer protection than any other state in the country.

## Mexican Actor Picked Up by Disney Marvel Studios

With the 11th Annual Los Cabos International Film Festival going on last week in Cabo San Lucas at the Cinemex Theater complex in the Puerto Paraiso mall, Disney's Marvel Studios premiered "Wakanda Forever", the sequel to the 2018 first Black Panther film.

Per Wikipedia, as the Black



Panther, Boseman led a predominantly black cast in a major blockbuster for the first time. "His performance as T'Challa has become a piece of history, because a Black epic, even a period piece, is forever expected to be important, representative of the past, present, and future," said Robert Daniels of the British BBC Culture website7magazine. "Through his acting, Boseman rewrote, and reclaimed black history."

Academy award-winning actress, Viola Davis, added "he is going to be remembered as a hero", both as the Black Panther and for the authentic man he was, and that "his legacy, his body of work, his integrity, is going to influence generations

upon generations to come."

BBC Culture called Boseman "a film icon who changed Hollywood"; "a symbol of black excellence and of cinematic excellence"; and "a virtuoso and heroic figure, not just because of his iconic turn as Marvel's Black Panther but for how he raised the bar for racial equality and representation on screen." The BBC also noted his impact of infusing African authenticity into his work, as how T'Challa is presented, saying that he "connects African-American audiences with their African heritage."

This brings us full circle to the spectacular changes Marvel Studios producer Kevin Feige, and co-screenplay writer/director Ryan Coogler and their team made to the Wakada Forever film. Specifically, the complete overhaul to one of the first and oldest superheroes from the Marvel and comic books universe. Prince Namor, The Sub-Mariner is Lord, King and Monarch of Atlantis, the city beneath the sea. This creative and welcome change may very well connect Mexican-American audiences with their MesoAmerican heritage, in which they made Namor, an Aztec Mayan Prince Namor, ruler of his underwater country known as Talokan.

In Mexico, Tlālōcān is described in several Aztec codices as a paradise, ruled over

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by the rain god, Tlāloc and his queen Chalchiuhtlicue. Actor Tenoch Huerta, who was born in Ecatepec, Mexico City has been cast as the epic new Namor. Huerta has appeared in a number of movies in Latin America and Spain. His father enrolled him in an acting course with María Elena Saldaña where he started appearing on film in 2006 at age

25. The dark-skinned Huerta family is of indigenous descent from a Nahua maternal great-grandmother and a Purépecha paternal great-grandmother.

Weeks and months before the November 11 release of Wakanda Forever, Tenoch Huerta likeness action figures have been flying off the shelves

This huge hit made sugar a lot more expensive during the following years and even considered a luxury item. Nowadays, sugar is too expensive and less sweet than fructose syrup, so more and more industries are replacing this ingredient, and it is not profitable to export anymore, leaving Mexican sugar in a tight spot. In that same idea, most sugar cane plantations and sugar refineries are owned by a very tight group of people and it is a very hard business to

Consuming sugarcane is not as hard as it looks, but you have to be a little cautious, as there is a risk of hurting your fingers with the use of a sharp knife. To peel the sugarcane, the only equipment you will require is a

sharp knife, a steady hand and a little common sense. Make sure that the knife is sharp enough. Otherwise, you will end up wasting your valuable energy without getting a single piece of chewable sugarcane. Yes, there's a wrong way to do it.

The sugarcanes are usually sold short enough to manage. When these are sold in the stores, they are usually cut into smaller pieces, many times without the "knee" part. But, if you get to buy the long sticks of sugarcane, you have to cut them first into smaller pieces. Discard the knees before you start peeling.


These smaller pieces are now ready for peeling. Use the sharp knife to start peeling at the smooth end. Cut the peel along the outer layer of the sugarcane as long as you can, lengthwise. It will be a little bit like doing some hardcore gardening.

When the peeling is done, cut the sugarcane into smaller pieces so that they can be chewed easily. Think about a half-inch thick and three inches long. Sugar cane is not meant to be swallowed, but chewed on while sucking the juice and punch out!

Last but not least, Tamarind (Tam-uh-rind). It is also very commonly found in Mexican candy and used in a sourerspicier context. A tamarind tree is very large (up to 100 feet tall) and grows very slowly. It is native to Africa but grows well in any tropical climate. It also made its way in our country with Spaniards who had previously been around the other side of the world. It bears fruits that are around 6 inches in length and look like a large, curved bean pod. Young tamarind fruit has a pliable brown skin and the inside greenish with whitish seeds. As the fruit matures the greenish insides turn brown and the pod becomes more bulbous. As the fruit dries out, the pod becomes stiff and brittle, the insides become pasty and the seeds turn brown.

Jalisco, Guerrero, Colima, Chiapas, and Veracruz are the top tamarind producers in Mexico. Most trees are planted for the fruit, but some are planted as shade trees because they are so wide. Tamarind

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fruit flavor is very popular and is used to flavor many foods and candies and even water. The quickest way to get to the pulp is to break the shell by hand and remove the sticky pulp with your fingers. For commercial usage, the entire pod is boiled to soften the outer shell, then it is ground up with water and strained so that the pulp is removed from the bits of shell and seed. The pulp is then canned for later sale.

The flavor of the greenish un-ripened tamarind is very watery, acidic and very sour. The ripened sticky pulp has a musky flavor and is sweet and sour due to the sugars and the acid content. The ripe tamarind pulp has many uses. Some recipes call for the pulp to be removed from the pod first, and others allow soaking in the cooking liquid and breaking the pod open in the liquid to release the pulp, then straining the mixture to remove the pieces of the outer shell. Tamarind can be added to soups, marinades, or sweets.

This is a BIG recipe, written

for when you host a posada, but can be sized down! You will need a BIG pot, like the ones used for tamales!

Ingredients:

2 lb. of sugar cane

5 apples (whatever kind you like!)

5 pears

5 guavas

1 gallon of water

7 oz of tamarind

7 oz of prune

1 oz of Jamaica flower (dried hibiscus)

2 cloves

2 lbs. of piloncillo (unrefined brown sugar)

½ a cup of regular sugar

2 cinnamon sticks

Procedure:

Peel the sugar cane and cut into one-inch sticks.

Remove the hearts of the apples and pears and slice thinly.


Quarter the guavas and tejocotes.

Bring the water to a soft boil, add all the fruit, let it come to a roaring boil and cook for 20 minutes.

Add the tamarind, prunes,

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### **Fish Report**

#### Cabo

Los Cabos Tuna Jackpot, the last of the million-dollarplus cash prize tournaments in Baja Sur this year, wrapped them up by awarding approximately \$1.4 million to the winning teams.

Congratulations to Team Prestige Worldwide (#34), who took the title of Tournament Champions at the 2022 Cabo Tuna Jackpot with a 183.1-pound tuna. It won them over \$244,000 in payouts.

Second place went to Castro's Tournament Team (#123) with a 144.55-pound tuna, and Crudo (#70) took third with a 136.45-pound tuna worth \$282,500.

Meanwhile, the local fish-

ing is a bit scratchy, with just a few yellowfin tuna and some trophy-sized dorado mixed in. So check out this issue of "Fish Killer!"

#### San Jose del Cabo

The largest tournaments are over now, though the busy fall season continues. We are seeing crowds of anglers arriving, eager to take advantage of the great angling opportunities still available. The climate is almost perfect, with highs near 80 degrees and lows about 65 degrees, with mostly clear, sunny days. When the ocean conditions were favorable, there were moderate swells, and water temperatures were in the 78 to 81-degree range, with clean blue water found

close to shore. However, there were variable winds, predominately from the north during the first part of the week, and when the fierce winds blew, options were limited at times, but by the weekend, conditions had laid down, and the seas were ideal.

Still, no schools of sardina have been found. The closest reports were from La Paz, far out of our range! Bait supplies have consisted of caballito, ballyhoo, slabs of squid, and offshore San Jose del Cabo Hotel Zone, 3 to 5 miles out. There have been schools of mackerel starting to appear, which is early season for these grounds, even though the water temperature is still quite warm for this late in the month. More anglers are also trying to catch chihuil, which are great mackerel-sized bait – like candy for wahoo and all other gamefish.

Overall this week produced excellent fishing action. Although the week began with wahoo and dorado being the most common species, quite a few sailfish and striped marlin were found on the same grounds, with most charters now congregating on the various locations from the Gordo Banks, Cardon, La Fortuna, Iman, San Luis and to Vinorama. Wahoo were striking on trolled Rapalas and on traphooked live bait. Sizes ranged to over 40 pounds, with average fish in the 20 to 30-pound class. Dorado were found scattered throughout, striking on similar offerings, with sizes up to 15 pounds.

Marlin action picked up in local waters, with the arrival of mackerel schools straight off the marina area, within several miles offshore. In addition, a few quality black marlin in the 300 to 350-pound range were

landed and brought in off the Gordo Banks.

After becoming scarce and finicky through much of the week, mainly due to north winds, the yellowfin bite picked up over the weekend, with the most popular spots being Gordo Banks, Iman, and Vinorama. There were no big numbers, but there was a good chance of catching one or two nice ones. The quality of these fish was impressive. We saw tuna from 20 pounds to 150 pounds, with a high percentage of them over 100 pounds. These yellowfin hit various bait, from live chihuil, squid strips, and old-school skipjack chunks. Either while drift fishing or on the slow troll.

Again, there was not much along the shoreline, and bottom action was limited. However, we did see a few more bonito and amberjack. The most impressive structure fish was a whopper 60- pound dogtooth taken off the Inner Gordo.

The first pods of whales are returning to local waters after migrating north to their summer feeding grounds. In the coming months, we will see peak activity for these mammals...Eric Brictson, Gordo Banks Pangas

#### **East Cape**

November continues to surprise visiting anglers. "Fresh Catch" fishing out of Palmas de Cortez treated Kate Villinger and guests to a "banner" wahoo day. They ran to the north end of Isla Cerralvo, where they caught four wahoo between 20 and 40-pounds.

According to locals, the sierra is ideal for ceviche. They are beginning to show early mornings before the north winds come up, along with a few jacks and roosterfish falling into the catch-and-release category.

#### La Paz




California, and Todos Santos, Baja California Sur, Mexico.

But they became even bigger stressors when paying guests were about to arrive thinking there was central heat and refrigeration.

The homes themselves were completely different. In Tahoe, it was a room in a single-family residence that was available to rent, with Reed staying down the hall. In Todos Santos it was the bottom floor of a house, with Reed living upstairs with a separate entrance.

Besides pulling back the covers on what life is like as an Airbnb host, Reed also shares what it is like to live in these two diverse locations, making the book a bit of a travelogue.

and discouragement that often lead to stepping out of your plan."

5. Plan a Place for Items "Have a place for everything and everything in its place."

may come up. Also, they must be available seven days per week to answer your questions and communicate with you regularly.

Does your property manager have a strong team of professionals?

Your property manager must have a great property management team that consists of property management experts with diverse skill sets to handle every possible situation or request. Their team members should visit your house once a week to ensure its perfect condition of it when your house is unoccupied. Then, they must report and coordinate the fixing of any maintenance issue, turn on your AC units once a month, run the water in the faucets and showers to avoid smells, water your plants, accompany any supplier when needed, etc.

almost walked away when we heard next that after the buyer and seller execute a standard real estate agreement and the buyer's initial deposit clears, the title for the property and the fideicomiso transfers to the buyer. She quickly continued with further details and we started get more comfortable. A Pagare is very flexible, negotiated between the buyer and seller with the details communicated to a settlement agent or lawyer who works with a Notary to have the whole agreement documented, signed off by the buyer and registered. By registering the agreement, the Pagare is recorded on the

property title like a lien so the buyer can't resell the property out from under you.

Not long after, we accepted an offer with a Pagare on our condo and had done the deal in hand. We wished we had known about this years earlier but hey things were going fine now. It did take about 3 months to get a fully notarized copy of the agreement (an impressive bound 10 pages of legal documentation) but the terms were in force regardless and the interest clock was ticking on our behalf.

The terms of the document are very clear and very powerful. For example, we agreed that after an initial deposit of 30% we would carry the financing (which means we agreed to wait) for 2 years to get the remaining 70% of the selling price. Meanwhile, the buyer agreed to pay us an interest rate of 6%. We would get monthly interest payments and would accept early principal paydown at the buyer's option. The outstanding balance was due in full in 24 months.

One of our biggest concerns (after a potential default) was if the buyer quit making interest payments; what could we do? This is where the powerful language kicks in if any scheduled payment - either interest or principal – is missed and not rectified in 10 days an additional 3% penalty is applied and the Pagare deal is terminated. The buyer then has to produce the entire balance due immediately or the property title reverts back to the seller. That means the buyer has forfeited all monies paid to date including the deposit and all interest payments AND we get a clear title back. Now we fully understood why our agent had never seen one of these deals fail as it would be

horrendously expensive for the buyer.

As it turned out our buyer was great; they wired the interest payments to our bank account in Canada each quarter in advance, made early principal pay downs and paid the whole thing off in 18 months, 6 months early of the deadline. Needless to say, we were happy with the whole deal and it was a win-win experience for both seller and buyer.

So the moral of the story is if you are a seller keep this option open and if you are a buyer and need a little help to buy a place offer a Pagare to the seller and see if you can make the deal happen and get your piece of paradise.



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## U.S. Tax Facts For Americans Living in Los Cabos

### BY DON. D. NELSON

Many residents of Baja Sur who are also U.S. citizens are unaware of various aspects of U.S. tax laws which might affect them. Some of those items are as follows:

The U.S. State department may refuse to issue you a renewed passport if the IRS has reported to them you are delinquent on your U.S. tax obligations. U.S. Customs can seize your passport if the IRS has informed them you owe \$50,000 or more in U.S. taxes and penalties. You can get your IRS tax transcript

to determine if you owe the IRS money by phone, mail or online.

Even if you have dual citizenship (both Mexican and U.S.) you still must file a U.S. tax return on your worldwide income if you earn above a certain amount.

Even though you live in Mexico, you still must file a U.S. tax return each year assuming you have earned in excess of a minimum amount from wages or investments if you are a U.S. citizen or permanent resident. You are

obligated to keep the IRS updated on any change of address to Mexico. Failure to do so is no excuse should the IRS pursue you for taxes, penalties and interest

There is no statute of limitations for the IRS to audit your return if you haven't filed one. In most cases, the agency doesn't go back further than six years. However, it has the right to look back for an unlimited amount of time. There is no IRS statute of limitations on unfiled tax returns.

Failure to report foreign Mexico and offshore bank accounts with combined highest balances exceeding \$10,000 U.S. to the U.S. Treasury can result is a \$10,000 penalty per year or more if the IRS should discover your error prior to you filing the required form 114. Mexico and other foreign banks are reporting your bank



balances to the IRS.

Income from the rental of your Mexican property must be reported in Mexico for tax purposes and also must be reported on your U.S. income tax return. The good news is if you pay Mexican income taxes on your net rental income you can claim it as a credit directly offsetting your U.S. income tax on the same rental income

shown on your U.S. tax return. You do not pay double tax.

One of the recurring criticisms, from both critics and the viewing public, of Nicole Kidman in *Being the Ricardo's* is that she just isn't Lucille Ball. Some fault the makeup, arguing that it makes Kidman's face stiff and unable to deliver the kinds of expressions that make Lucy famous. Others suggest Kidman is just too cool of an actress to play the hot-headed redhead. Kidman, herself, said she was "terrified" of the role and wondered whether she would successfully pull it off. Coupled with similar criticisms of Javier Bardem as Desi Arnaz, then, it isn't hard to understand why this film rates near the bot-

tom of the critical and popular scales among this year's Oscarnominated movies - people didn't like this film because their images of Lucy and Desi weren't in it!

I get all of that - in fact, early into my first watching of the film I asked my wife the simple question - could anyone successfully impersonate Lucille Ball? Think about that a while and try to come up with personalities that might have been chosen. Lucille Ball is simply a one-of-a-kind character and I don't think anyone can become her. So, if what you demand is a high-fidelity rendering of the main character in this film, you

are going to be disappointed - and, it appears, many viewers were.

But that is an unfair expectation, because this is really an excellent movie. If you can back off the notion that this is somehow a true-life biography of Lucille Ball and her marriage to Desi Arnaz, then the movie takes on some amazing power. Considered a chronicle of an actress, and her troubled marriage to a brilliant but conflicted man, all thrown together in a stewing pot of a television production and a nationwide political storm and you have an amazing movie. That it might also provide some insight into



two of America's cultural icons is just an added bonus.

The cast worked very well together and ended up earning three Oscar nominations. Nicole Kidman received a Leading Actress nomination not because of her physical comedy, but because she nails the dramatic scenes. 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

'While our Golden Age elders may have believed Bill Everett's 1940's Sub-Mariner was the most unique superhero ever created and while others can argue that Stan Lee's Silver Age 1960's version was the best of all time, the 2022 Marvel Studios "Wakanda Forever" MesoAmerican Mayan Aztec Prince Namor is by far the greatest the world will ever know," said Luis Rodriguez of San Jose, CA, who publishes "Aztec of the City". One of the first Mexican-American comic book superheroes ever created, it made its debut on Cinco de Mayo, 1993 and has been featured in the Washington Post, Lowrider and Hispanic Magazines, as well as New York City's Remezcla news.

William Blake Everett (1917–1973) created Namor the Sub-Mariner and co-created Daredevil with writer Stan Lee for Marvel Comics. Bill Everett was raised in Watertown, Massachusetts, near the city named after his great-grandfather, Everett, Massachusetts.

Everett's father ran a successful trucking business, and



when Everett was young the family bought a large summer home in Kennebunkport, Maine. Both his parents supported the artistic talents of their son. At the age of 12, Everett contracted tuberculosis, and was pulled from sixth grade to go with his mother and his sister to Arizona, to recuperate for four months. Taking his first drink at 16, Everett began his path to teenage alcoholism. In 1934 Everett studied at Boston's Vesper George School of Art, where his inability to focus led him to drop out in 1935.

Everett knew his father "always wanted me to be a



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cartoonist, and he died, unfortunately, before he saw that come true," he said.

"Everett was a man who lived comics throughout his entire life and loved it with a passion. It's important not only to remember the characters, but the men behind them," said Chris Marshall, of the Collected Comics Library.

quiet. The folks here are mostly tourists and snowbirds looking for some sunshine. Not much of anyone here that is specifically here to fish.

If someone does want to fish, they are usually walk-in folks just looking for a day on the water. Nothing hard-core. Most savvy fisherfolks have left as the 2022 fishing season winds down.

The winter winds have started blowing from the north, making a fish trip an exercise in figuring out which days the winds won't blow you off the water. We had three days of the week that were too windy two weeks ago. This past week, there were two days. So as I write this, it appears that maybe five days will be pretty windy.

You can probably get out on some of those days, and we would fish you in some of the more protected in-shore areas. But if the wind is really howling, there's a good chance the

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Port Captain will shut down all boat traffic. Either departing or arriving.

There is still some dorado around. Most of them are the fun, smaller 5 to 12-pounders with occasional big toad bulls still lurking. One nice thing is that you could go to the big tankers anchored in La Paz Bay and find some schools without going too far.

There is some wahoo at the north end of Cerralvo Island, but for the most part, the weather is cooling, and so are the waters, with blue waters starting to turn green and cloudy. Consequently, more cooler-water species are moving in.

This includes sierra, rainbow runners, pargo, cabrilla, jacks, and even a few amberjack and yellowtail. These will become more predominant as the waters continue to cool off.

Mostly, live bait (sardina) and cut bait (stripped bonito) have been the most effective attractants, but as waters get rougher, it's harder to find the sardina. Also, the bait guys will be more reluctant to go find

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
### Simple Car Maintenance Baja Style

If you drove down to Cabo or keep a vehicle here for convenience you know that the term "off the beaten track" also applies to the state of many roads. Those rough and dusty roads and the oven-like heat will take a toll, too. Even if you stick to paved roads, normal wear and tear will eventually take you down.

Just because the car starts when you turn the key doesn't mean you won't be stranded at some point in your travels. An unmaintained car is a problem waiting to happen and the longer you leave it the more unsafe and expensive it becomes. If you have a good mechanic who maintains your car regularly, then great. However, I've had enough people call and ask me if I know a mechanic right about the time their car starts misbehaving or because good mechanics are always busy. The wait to get your car fixed can be days or even weeks if the parts aren't available.

There are a lot of simple

grams and a list of milestones

for things to check. Put the

milestone dates in your phone

calendar as a reminder.

Brake fluid is in a reservoir, likely at the back right. It should have a high and low indicator on the outside, so easy peasy. As your brakes wear,

the system uses more fluid to accommodate the brake pad travel. If the fluid is low, refill it. The most common type of brake fluid is labeled Dot 3 but check the manual if you're uncertain.

Power steering fluid reservoirs are typically on the left side and have a small dipstick attached to the cap with high/low marks. If you hear a growling sound when you turn the steering wheel your power steering fluid is low. Always check this fluid when the car is warm to get a proper reading. Often it just needs a small top-up.

Radiator fluid is called antifreeze/coolant. Obviously, your engine isn't going to freeze in Cabo, but the coolant includes a water pump lubricant and rust inhibitors. Radiator fluid use is contingent on the amount of driving, with more users in hot weather and stretches of mountain terrain.

The radiator will be right in front; look down. You don't

Best to talk fast because these numbers are not toll free. And yeah, we know any business that deals in toll frees doesn't have a live person answering the phone, so good luck with making it a speedy call.

need to open the radiator; there's a reservoir by the top of the rad with a high/low marker on its side. You may need a flashlight. Don't confuse the radiator reservoir with the window washer reservoir. If you follow the little overflow tube from the top of the radiator, you'll find it.

Window wash fluid should be topped up regularly for safe driving. The reservoir is usually on the left over the wheel well. Water works fine in Cabo. No worries about freezing, but Baja summer heat will deteriorate plastic, so keeping the reservoir full limits reservoir cracks and leaks. The part is also stupidly expensive to replace.

Oil is also checked with a dipstick on the right side of the engine. Check for level and color. Clean oil is usually yellowish. Pull the ring and check the high/low markers at the bottom. Gas station attendants always offer to check the oil when you're filling up. Just make sure they show you the dipstick before agreeing to buy the oil (scam alert). Whether the attendant fills up the oil or you do, you'll need to know what kind of oil is in there.

Experts say mixing oils (synthetic and conventional) is a bad idea. If you don't know and can't remember the last time the oil was changed, it's probably time to change the oil and its filter. Make note of

the oil type at that time. Having your car's oil and filter changed on a regular basis is the single most important thing you can do to maintain the life of your car. If you take your car in for an oil change in Cabo, you also need to tell them to change the oil filter. Up north they do it automatically, but not in Cabo.

Transmission fluid, usually red in color, is also checked from the back of the engine with a dipstick with high/low markers. Like power steering fluid you check it with the engine warm. Never overfill it or you could damage the transmission seals. If you can't find the dipstick you may have a sealed tranny in which case you won't need to check it.

Batteries also vary between sealed units or conventional lead/acid. If it's sealed, leave it alone. If it's not you can pop the caps with a screwdriver, get a flashlight and look in the cells. Top up as needed with distilled or demineralized water only. Batteries use up more water in a hot climate; the lead plates need to be covered with fluid at all times to maintain the charge. Level up to just under the top of the battery casing.

That's it for fluids! Two more checks and you're done -- air filters and tires.

There are usually 2 air filters in a car, one under the hood and another in the cabin. Cabo is dusty and those filters need **CONTINUED ON PAGE 31**

portray their characters with a precision that is uncanny. Simmons received a Supporting Actor nomination for his role here and Arianda probably should have. The interactions between all four of these characters were wonderful and illustrate a terrific ensemble team - something that is always as much fun to watch as it must have been to film.

The fact that this film received three acting nominations and nothing for directing or writing is puzzling. In my opinion, the strength of this film is in the script and the way the story is told. And for that, the credit goes to Aaron Sorkin. His scripts (The Social Network, Moneyball, The Trial of the Chicago 7) have a unique way of taking very complex subjects (like courtroom proceedings, or a gambling ring) and explaining them with rapid

dialog. His characters are always deep and often conflicted people, rooted in real life, who are under intense pressure. The plot is executed more as conversations between characters than as heavy action scenes and he often mashes together scenes from different locations or times to help elaborate on a common theme.

In Being the Ricardo's for example, he uses several different tricks to tell the story. In one of them, we peer deep into Lucy's mind as she imagines how an episode they are working on is going to play out. He pictures Lucy's thinking in black and white because that is how it would have been shown on television at the time. Sorkin also brings in elements of a "mockumentary" interviewing some of the minor characters - using actors portraying them as much older people.

This commentary helps frame events by telling back stories which might then be the basis for a flashback. He uses

this technique several times to tell the story of how Lucy and Desi met and how they ended up doing this particular television show together.

Unfortunately, the biggest complaint is that Sorkin doesn't exactly tell the real story. I don't know how many times I read that the events portrayed in this movie didn't happen the way it was suggested. The movie supposedly takes place during the week Lucy and Desi were filming a particularly famous episode of "I Love Lucy" - the fight between the Mertz's. (There is a dated newspaper featured in the film that suggests it was the week of Sept 8 - Sept. 12, 1952). It turns out that that particular episode couldn't have been filmed that week. Then it turns out that the three huge events that happened that week - that give the film all of its dramatic import - actually occurred in multiple other weeks and didn't occur together at all! (For example, Ball's first pregnancy



was a year earlier.)

For some, I guess, the precise attention to biographical facts really matters - enough to thoroughly pan this movie. But I come away with a very different take. The title of the movie isn't "A Week in the Life of the Ricardos" - instead, it is "Being the Ricardos". And it isn't billed as a documentary, but rather a dramatic rendering of what these two phenomenal people were like. What Sorkin has accomplished is not a day-

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of the

by-day, blow-by-blow, account of a week in the lives of these people. Rather, by combining events from multiple years and melding them together into one very complex and emotional week, we get a real sense of what was motivating these people and what made their lives move.

Sorkin's screenplay may not be a time-line accurate in the facts that it presents, but it does tell a moving story about two people who struggled very hard as imperfect beings to love each other and live their own lives with all warts and blemishes that unfold. For me, Sorkin's screenplay, like so many of his earlier works, should have been nominated - it is a wonderful work and his film is a remarkable example of movie craftsmanship.

I get that maybe Kidman and Bardem just aren't Lucy and Desi, but the film delivers an emotionally rich and intellectually challenging take on just what it might be like "Being *the Ricardos*". (4 Stars)

regular replacement. You'll save a ton of money on fuel and breathe easy. The location for engine filters vary, so check your manual. Once you find it, take out the filter and bang it on the ground to shake out the dust. Never brush it but you could blow it out with your vacuum on the reverse or an air hose. This will extend its use, but it's a good idea to plan routine replacement. The cabin filter is usually accessed through a panel in the glove box. Check the manual for that one and do the same thing.
