Another Labor Day has come and gone but the significance of the federal holiday and how it relates to the work we do and the people we serve daily holds true no matter what time of year it is.

Traditionally celebrated on the first Monday of September, Labor Day is meant to recognize and honor the American labor movement, and the significant contributions workers have made to the developments and achievements of the United States. It became an official holiday June 28, 1894, when President Grover Cleveland signed a bipartisan bill into law following a burgeoning

movement by trade unionists for a specific day to be set aside for celebrating labor.

Today, DWD's efforts help strengthen Indiana's overall workforce as well as the work-related status of many Hoosiers, individually. In fact, thanks in part to our workforce programs, Indiana's July 2024 unemployment rate was 4.0% compared to a national unemployment rate of 4.3%. Additionally, from 2007 to 2023, average hourly earnings grew 49% in Indiana. One other interesting note I'd like to share is that since 2017, Indiana has grown faster than the nation in productivity. Our success in upskilling Hoosiers is a direct result of what you do.

You are making a difference in the lives of many. Thank you for helping us collectively celebrate Labor Day every day.





July Employment Report

Indiana's July unemployment rate stood at 4.0%, according to the Indiana Department of Workforce Development. By comparison, the national unemployment rate for July was 4.3%.

Indiana's labor force participation rate of 62.5% is now .1% higher than it was in June but still slightly below the national rate of 62.7%.







PPMO Already Benefiting SIDES Project

DWD's Project Portfolio Management Office (PPMO) was introduced only a few months ago but team members and the concepts they're sharing are already having an impact on the agency by creating consistency in how groups manage priorities and helping develop cohesion across businesses within DWD. For example, PPMO guidance has been instrumental in helping create smooth and efficient workflow while ensuring a strong work environment in relation to the State Information Data Exchange System (SIDES) project, which launched in July.

"SIDES is a NASWA product. The first phase of the SIDES project involves Single Sign On (SSO) capabilities," said DWD's Suzanne Manning, SIDES Owner/UI Benefits Subject Matter Expert and Director of UI Benefits Administration. "It's largely employer focused. SIDES has its own look and feel but we're reducing the number of doors an employer has to go through to access information with SSO."

PPMO Senior Project Manager Kim Peck had to first familiarize herself with SIDES before assuming the role of project lead for the initiative.

"I had to understand what it is and how it connects to Uplink and ESS," she said.

Once there, Peck implemented PPMO practices, beginning with analysis and formulating a plan housed within a PPMO template.

"Every project has phases, roles, and responsibilities," she said. "You have to look at the overall body in scope and ask who the players are. You then have to look for gaps in some templates. After we did a gap analysis, we made sure we would be able to communicate effectively to project stakeholders.

"I worked with (PPMO Director Kelly Sandstrom) to create a project checklist, built it out in Excel, and then in SharePoint."

The group introduced what it refers to as its Charter Starter—a combination sign-off phase and kickoff July 11 when team members presented a plan overview and timeline for consideration and approval by sponsors, key stakeholders, and leadership.

Since that time, with a May 15, 2025, target completion date, the project has moved along efficiently and progressed according to plan.

"PPMO has been a great help and Kim has been a wonderful project manager," Manning said. "She has a very optimistic and enthusiastic approach and helps make sure all the different units are connected and doing their job. Her organizational skills are just off the chart."

In addition, Manning said the PPMO structure has also helped project team members understand the importance of having regularly scheduled meetings and how to prepare for those sessions. Shane Kelly is the project's technical lead and product owner for employer services.

"PPMO has provided some additional structure around the project," he said. "It has helped us plan around what is needed and when."

Kelly is also appreciative of the guidance and direction Peck has provided while working side-by-side with team members.

"Kim is in our meetings, understanding the issues and risks we're facing and helping to remove them," he added. "For those things that don't necessarily fall under our umbrella, she's taking charge and taking them to others."

Like her teammates, Manning is already sold on the many benefits PPMO brings to the table. "PPMO is a huge asset to have in these big projects, but I can also see how it would be beneficial to have them involved in smaller projects."

Obviously, Peck agrees.

"I want everyone to understand that we're a partner and that PPMO is a partnership to success," she said.



Getting to Know the DWD MarComms Team

Lindsay Lindsey - Chief of Marketing and Communication

As head of the MarComms team, I design the marketing and communication strategy for DWD. This includes reviewing projects to approve, use of brand guides and messaging, coordinating team member tasks within our projects, and updating DWD leaders on our efforts. I also help intake project needs from the various groups the MarComms team serves within DWD.

Stephanie Genrich - Marketing Director

I oversee all marketing projects from creating the best strategy to implementation. This often requires working backwards while identifying the target audience and asking additional questions. For large projects, I act as the conduit between DWD and the external group. For smaller projects, I work with our graphic designer, videographer or web developer to create content.

Elizabeth Presson - Communication Director

As the head of external public relations and internal communications, I create and review DWD messaging. Additionally, I lead all communication strategies and act as the agency spokesperson. I also build media relations, handle crisis communication coordination and ensure consistency in messaging.

Matt Hetzel - Webmaster

My primary areas of responsibility include website development, web analytics and digital accessibility. I work with DWD colleagues and regional partners on designing, editing, and managing in.gov web pages and internal facing sites. Additionally, I analyze web traffic data and create dashboards for DWD departments and work to make digital content more accessible.

Trae Hester - Multimedia Specialist (Videographer)

As a multimedia specialist, I create content using video, photography, graphics, illustrations, and sound. My work is used on the web and through social media. I also design, develop, edit, and deliver engaging DWD media packages.

Greg Seiter - Communications Consultant

A lot of my work is focused on internal communications but some of what I do also has external relevance. I create and design DWD's monthly INsider newsletter and internal message boards. I also spearhead the agency's monthly report to the Governor's office, write bi-weekly website blog stories, update the Job Postings map, represent the department on DWD's ECC team and edit/proofread documents for MarComms and other DWD areas as well.

Luke MacGregor - *Graphic Designer*

My primary areas of responsibility include branding, visual communication, and photography. I work in both internal and external visual communication and will be striving to make a more cohesive and robust brand for DWD. The kinds of things I work with on a daily basis are documents, presentations, logos, typography, social posts, posters, flyers and data visualizations.

Sarah Potter - Director of Government and Legislative Affairs

Focusing on legislation and governmental relations, my primary responsibilities include working on legislation and serving as the liaison between the agency, members of the legislature, and the Governor's Office. I help create the agency's legislative proposals for upcoming legislative sessions, and then during each session, I meet with legislators and attend committee hearings to discuss our proposals and gain enough support for them to be passed into law. I monitor all legislation that may impact the agency and work to neutralize bills that don't serve our agency's goals.

Andrew Willett - Intern

As an audio/video intern, I shoot video and create videos. My main focus with DWD is now with OW-BLA through which I will be helping tell impactful stories and creating videos for both internal and external use.

Employee Spotlight - Barb Milligan

A homegrown Hoosier and 39-year state employee, Barb Milligan emphasizes family values and group unity when building a team-based work environment as DWD's Assistant Director of Grant, Contracts and Procurement.

While growing up in Monrovia, IN, Milligan developed an appreciation for family early in life. She started high school in Monrovia but ultimately graduated from Perry Meridian High School (Indianapolis) in 1984.

"I lived next door to my grandparents, which was great," Milligan said. "that's where I learned the value of a close family."

"I also have an identical twin sister, which is pretty neat. We are really close and talk to each other every day."

After high school, Milligan took a few college courses but eventually chose to go in another direction. Her first job was at a McDonald's and then she spent some time working at a grocery store.

"I went from fast food and grocery store work straight into office work," she said.

She joined the Department of Administration (IDOA) as a file clerk in September of 1985 and then took on responsibilities associated with food purchasing, IT product purchasing, and contract compliance for the state of Indiana.

She moved on to DWD in October 2001, joining the agency as a Purchasing Specialist before advancing to the position of Purchasing Manager. Later, she took on the Grants Department.

In 2004, Milligan became Procurement Director, a position she still holds today.

Milligan now oversees everything purchased through the agency from high-dollar contracts to day-to-day items and all dollars granted to DWD's recipients.

However, through it all, Milligan insists her favorite part of the job is being a part of the camaraderie that exists between all DWD's different finance departments.

"It's not that way in every agency, but (DWD) finance is a close-knit group. We work together to get the job done," she said. "It starts with two wonderful group leads, Jennifer Michael and Julie Sheppard."

Outside of work, Milligan enjoys vacationing and spending time with family. Last summer, she successfully combined the two while renting a nine-bedroom house for 30 people at Panama City Beach, Florida. But for Milligan and her husband, Jim, it all comes back to family, which is part of the reason why the two often host grandchildren on weekends.

"My favorite thing (when vacationing) is to go to the beach. We did that as a family and had a blast. We are just a tight-knit family," she said. "On Sundays, we go to church and then have Sunday dinner together."



Employee Spotlight - Mary Burns

Mary Burns is extremely proud of her professional growth through 36 years at DWD. Her current title is Adjudication Program Director.

"When I first started, I did not have a clue about unemployment offices or laws or anything," Burns said. "I am very proud of my accomplishments and knowledge in the unemployment system."



She is from the Indianapolis area and went to Broad Ripple High School. A standout athlete there, Burns went to Kentucky State University on a basketball scholarship. Unfortunately, she suffered a torn ACL and could not continue her career.

Before earning her degree, Burns became a mother and worked a few odd jobs to help provide for her family. She was a cashier and scheduler at a grocery store, worked part-time at a liquor store, and scheduled people and managed security at an office. Ultimately, her first job at DWD came in 1988 as an Hourly Claims Taker.

Eventually, Burns returned to school and graduated from IUPUI in 1998 with a degree in Criminal Justice. While she dreamed of a career as an appointed judge, she decided to stay in State government.

"When I was seeking other employment in the criminal justice system, unfortunately, it was not paying as much as I was making at DWD," Burns said. "So, I continued with the department."

Burns moved from DWD's tax department to the contact center where she gained permanent status. There, she was promoted to a leadership position before moving to the adjudication center as a Claims Investigator.

Burns received several promotions over the next few years and worked her way up to the role of Claims Deputy Supervisor in 2012. In 2017, she became an Assistant Director of Unemployment Programs before assuming her current role as Program Director in 2020.

Burns said her favorite part of the job is that no two situations are exactly alike. She takes pride in her experience and for having a growth mindset.

"I am hoping for a little more growth before I leave," Burns said. "I am learning everything about unemployment that you could ever imagine. It has been a good place to work."

Away from DWD, Burns prioritizes time with her husband Reese and her three adult children, Melvin, Shawkie and Shawkia, along with grandchildren Mason, Londyn and Khylan. She also enjoys couponing and travel.

"I got a really bad one (hobby). I just love to get the passport stamped. And we have a timeshare in Florida," Burns said. "Traveling is good for me. That, plus couponing, are my two favorite hobbies."

Banks attended the job fair, as did Northeast Indiana Works President and CEO Edmond O'Neal and Sean Ryan, director of

the Office of Engagement at PFW.

WorkOne Northeast representatives were also on hand to assist people with resume

development, job interview techniques, and job search guidance.

Many employers reported finding promising candidates at the fair and the consensus of employers was that the event was a success.





"Although the job market in northeast Indiana has cooled somewhat, there are still plenty of open positions," said Rick Farrant, director of communications for Northeast Indiana Works, which oversees the region's 11 WorkOne career centers.

A recent Northeast Indiana Works online survey of employers drew 48 respondents and indicated that nearly 60 percent intend to increase their workforces in the next year. Only one expected to decrease their workforce.


Muncie YouthBuild's 4th Cohort Graduates
